# Scripture Genesis 22:1-14

After these things God tested Abraham and said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here am I." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains of which I shall tell you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac. And he cut the wood for the burnt offering and arose and went to the place of which God had told him. On the third day Abraham lifted up his eyes and saw the place from afar. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; I and the boy will go over there and worship and come again to you."

And Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on Isaac his son. And he took in his hand the fire and the knife. So they went both of them together. And Isaac said to his father Abraham, "My father!" And he said, "Here am I, my son." He said, "Behold, the fire and the wood, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God will provide for himself the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So they went both of them together.

When they came to the place of which God had told him, Abraham built the altar there and laid the wood in order and bound Isaac his son and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to slaughter his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here am I. He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him, for now I know that you fear God, seeing you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham lifted up his eyes and looked, and behold, behind him was a ram, caught in a thicket by his horns. And Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called the name of that place, "The Lord will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided."

### Romans 6:12-23

Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Are we to sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God, that you who were once slaves of sin have become obedient from the heart to the standard of teaching to which you were committed, and, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms, because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to lawlessness leading to more lawlessness, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. But what fruit were you getting at that time from the things of which you are now ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

### Reflection

These two passages of Scripture are quite challenging for us set as they are in a very different world to ours and using images and metaphors which do not readily enable us to connect with the message they would seek to convey. Indeed the aborted sacrifice of Isaac is quite abhorrent for us and presents an image of God far removed from any that we would want to identify with. Yet it does highlight God's ultimate and enduring faithfulness and Abraham's absolute trust in God (and probably also reflects a time in Hebrew history when human sacrifice was recognised as totally against the will of God and not to be practised by his faithful people.) The story is also, surely, a forwarding looking understanding of the sacrificial death of Jesus and his status as the lamb of God that is the final sacrificial offering for God's people, changing forever the relationship between humanity and God from that of fearful subservience to the freedom of unfettered life embraced within the love of God forever. Paul was to express this in terms of the end of the enslavement of humanity to anything that limits the experiencing of life in the fulness of all its possibilities: what he refers to as" the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord". Resurrection life.! Yes life with an exclamation mark.

As Christians we are called to live this reality in such a way that it becomes the norm for all humanity, not just us. It is all too easy to confine our generosity to those we easily identify with in life and to consider others as less than the children of God. And, therefore, less than deserving the fulness of life that is what being human is all about. At a time when we are confronted once again with the challenge of racism along with a multitude of forms of prejudice and rejection it is timely to have to re-examine the universality of the call to fellowship in faithfulness. "Whoever receives you receives me, and whoever receives me receives him who sent me." This is the gospel. Thanks be to God!
