Reflection



The ancient story of the Garden of Eden was a story about the failure of humankind to maintain a right relationship with God and the alienation of humankind from God that was the outcome. Thus humankind was constantly seeking thereafter to re-engage with God but always failing to do so. We saw one of the ancient stories about this recently in the story of Jacob's ladder and his dream of the angels facilitating a re-engagement through the temporary linking of heaven and earth. The Hebrew scripture for today re-visits the quest, again through the experience of Jacob.

Jacob finds himself wrestling with a stranger until dawn breaks when his protagonist declares that he has in fact striven with God and with men and will henceforth be known as Israel i.e. in Hebrew "prince of God".

The ongoing saga of humankind's quest for a right relationship with God is, in Jacob, now finding a new high-point on the journey towards the realisation of the promise to Abraham of countless descendants; and blessings in the eyes of all nations.

The destiny of Israel is the path to right relations between humanity and God and this is to find ultimate fulfilment in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus and the establishment of the reign of God through this "second Adam".

Gospel Matthew 14:13-21

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a desolate place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore he saw a great crowd, and he had compassion on them and healed their sick. Now when it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a desolate place, and the day is now over; send the crowds away to go into the villages and buy food for themselves." But Jesus said, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They said to him, "We have only five loaves here and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass, and taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven and said a blessing. Then he broke the loaves and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And they all ate and were satisfied. And they took up twelve baskets full of the broken pieces left over. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children. Thanks be to God for the Gospel.

Reflection

Today would have seen us celebrating the Sacrament of Holy Communion at St Andrews if we were not in isolation. The renewed relationship between humanity and God finds its sacramental expression in a meal of five loaves and two fish presided over by Jesus on the shores of Galilee and now forever re-enacted at the Lord's Table "in remembrance of him" as we who are his faithful people seek to give expression to his life in our world as the final realisation of the restored right relation between God and humankind. And so our concluding hymn is John Bell's hymn for the celebration of the Sacrament:

Among us and before us, Lord, you stand with arms outstretched and bread and wine at hand. Confronting those unworthy of a crumb, you ask that to your table we should come.

Who dare say No, when such is your resolve our worst to witness, suffer and absolve, our best to raise in lives by God forgiven, our souls to fill on earth with food from heaven?

Who dare say No, when such is your intent to love the selves we famish and resent, to cradle our uncertainties and fear, to kindle hope as you in faith draw near?

Who dare say No, when such is your request that each around your table should be guest, that here the ancient word should live as now, 'Take, eat and drink — all this is meant for you'?

No more we hesitate and wonder why; no more we stand indifferent, scared or shy. Your invitation leads us to say Yes, to meet you where you nourish, heal and bless.

Prayers for Ourselves and Others and Lord's Prayer

Live in us, O God as you give us life, over and over again through word and sacrament. We see the majesty of your mercy to us and all creation in the renewal of your relation with us through Jesus Christ, the Second Adam.

We know that the needs of the world about us never end and our own needs are ever before you.

We come to you in prayer trusting that your reign will find fulfilment for all.

May the prophetic voices among us challenge us to see and hear what might be possible when your eternal reign embraces the whole creation as Jesus embraced those of long ago on the lakeside of Galilee.

And we know that we are now those who must hand to you the small offerings for the feeding of the thousands whose needs are so great in a world where so many are ignored by their fellows.

May we find ways of welcoming them in their needs rather than turning them away.

Gather us all into the sacred meal of your compassion and love, Lord Jesus Christ even as we pray in the words you taught us

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours
now and for ever.
