Reflection

Dreams...Reality... As we have focussed on Isaac, Jacob and Joshua in recent weeks we have seen how the Hebrew Scripture often blurs the line between dreams and reality, seeing both as bringing about insights into human experience and the understanding of humanity's relationship with God. So we saw Jacob caught between earth and heaven but linked with both by a ladder used by angels; and then there was Jacob's struggle with an angelic adversary who gave him a new identity as Israel, the Prince of God, because he had engaged successfully with God through the night-time encounter. But then the importance of dreams in the human experience gained new prominence through Jacob's son, Joseph, and his amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat and the saga that saw Israel advancing its history on a path to a new future; a future to find particular fruition in Moses, the Hebrew man raised by an Egyptian princess and who found himself encountered by God in a sacred engagement which proved to be a new moment of epiphany, blurring the lines between reality and the sacred in a bush that was burning but not consumed. Was not this the beginning of a wonderful and weird relationship with far reaching consequences for the outworking of the ancient promise to the Patriarch, Abraham, and the fulfilment in a crucified man and his resurrection life in a far off future. So we listen for the word of God in the Hebrew Scripture for today.

Exodus 3:1-15

Now Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law, Jethro, the priest of Midian, and he led his flock to the west side of the wilderness and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. And the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a

flame of fire out of the midst of a bush. He looked, and behold, the bush was burning, yet it was not consumed. And Moses said, "I will turn aside to see this great sight, why the bush is not burned." When the Lord saw that he turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Do not come near; take your sandals off your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." And he said, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have surely seen the affliction of my people who are in Egypt and have heard their cry because of their taskmasters. I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them out of the hand of the Egyptians and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the place of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Periz-zites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. And now, behold, the cry of the people of Israel has come to me, and I have also seen the oppression with which the Egyptians oppress them. Come, I will send you to Pharaoh that you may bring my people, the children of Israel, out of Egypt."

But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh and bring the children of Israel out of Egypt?" He said, "But I will be with you, and this shall be the sign for you, that I have sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall serve God on this mountain."

Then Moses said to God, "If I come to the people of Israel and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." And he said, "Say this to the people of Israel, 'I am has sent me to you.' " God also said to Moses, "Say this to the people of Israel, 'The Lord, the God of your fathers, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you.' This is my name forever, and thus I am to be remembered throughout all generations.

This is the word of the Lord "I AM WHO I AM."

Concluding Reflection

Moses was a very reluctant collaborator with God, fearful that he would not be taken seriously by his fellows. And why would he not be confident of their acceptance with his credentials? A Hebrew, yes, but identified with the Egyptian overlord and, therefore not really one with them: yet ultimately to be the greatest of the Hebrew leaders in their origin: a sanctified man who was to be entrusted with God's sacred Law itself and the translation of his chosen people to their place of destiny, the land of Israel.

We who are to be God's faithful in our time often struggle with feelings of inadequacy and the inability to translate the call to commitment to the Christ on the faith journey with Jesus. Do we not also hear the penetrating rebuff of our preferred understanding of where the sacred path lies? "Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to me. For you are not setting your mind on the things of God, but on the things of man." And what are the things of God for us? Are they not, ultimately true personal integrity in all our living. The integrity that makes us one with Jesus above all else. "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For

whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his life? Or what shall a man give in return for his life?" Yes, a daunting challenge indeed; but it is the challenge to enter into life in all its fulness and be an enabler for others to do likewise.
